Oscar Von Kuster was Among 1st to Answer Lincoln's Call to Serve in the Civil War

It is now 150 years since President Lincoln's issued a call for volunteers to serve in the Civil War. Oscar Von Kuster, then 22 and a stout-hearted logger near Stillwater, was among those who volunteered to join the Civil War, with many others from Minnesota. He was wounded, but went back to fight in other battles until the end of the war. He married Anna Margaretha Rohl, raised 10 children and farmed in the German Settlement for many years before being buried there in 1914. He was one of the last in the Last Man Club that met each year in Stillwater on July 21, Bull Run Day. He's one of our heros.

LAST MAN CLUB from TIME mag. At Stillwater, Minn., the Last Man Club was holding its last dinner. There were really three Last Men—Peter Hall, 89; Charles Lockwood, 86; John Goff, 85. Sixty-six years ago they had marched off to the Civil War with Company B of the First Minnesota Regiment. Many soldiers of Company B fell at their first battle—Bull Run—many at Antietam, at Gettysburg, at other battles that are history to almost everyone today but are memories to the old men of the Last Man Club. In 1886 there were only 34 Company B members surviving. In that year those 34 men formed the Last Man Club [based on their motto, "fight to the last man"]. They agreed to meet every year on July 21 (Bull Run Day), as long as any of them should be left alive. They put away a bottle of Burgundy from which the Last Man should drink a toast to his dead comrades. They decided that in their dining-hall there would be 34 chairs, even when most of those chairs should hold no occupant. And they appointed Mrs. Samuel Bloomer, widow of the Company's color sergeant to be custodian of their battle flag.

For last week's dinner Mrs. Bloomer had draped with black and ornamented with bouquets 31 of the 34 chairs. The three men who remained decided that this would be their last meeting, feeling, perhaps, that none of them might be left alive when July 21 should have arrived again. So they brought out the bottle of Burgundy and stood stiffly erect while Peter Hall gave the toast: "Men love

their country now, but our dead comrades loved "it most." The Last Dinner of the Last Man Club was history.

# Hammerschlagen (Nail pounding game of skill)

Hammerschlagen is a Germanic game of skill in which several contestants try to be first in hammering a nail into a cross-section of a log. The hammer is passed from one player to the next until someone countersinks their nail into the wood. It is usually considered an adult game, but children can play when accompanied by an adult. Prizes may be awarded to the winners and are subject to change.

ITEMS Required for a legitimate game of Hammerschlagen.

- \* One Stump or cross-section of a tree, at least 24 inches in diameter
- \* One 12 penny (3-1/4 inch) common nail per contestant.
- \* One hammer to pass around to take turns hitting the contestants own nail with one swing.

#### **RULES:**

- 1. Each contestant pays a deposit and places an amount in the center of the log the winner will get the amount in the center.
- 2. Contestants will have their nail started 1/4<sup>th</sup> inch by the host of the game
- 3. Each contestant gets one strike (*schlagen*) at the nail with the hammer using one swing and then passes the hammer to the next person.
- 4. If a contestant throws or drops the hammer or takes an extra swing he/she must place an additional amount in the center of the log before continuing in the game.
- 5. A winner is named after the winning contestant's nail is below the surface of the wood. At least one other contestant must verify that the nail is below the surface.
- 6. After the winner is verified the game continues until all nails are down. The last contestant with a nail above the surface must forfeit his/her deposit.
- 7. Hammerschlagen practice must be done with your own nails and logs.
